### Activities in a Time of Transition

I want to thank everyone who took the time to come and speak with me during my recent visit to Good Shepherd. I am in the process of writing up and summarizing what I heard in the various groups. The next step will be to return and present the results to the congregation.

I would like to lift up a couple of topics that repeated themselves. (This is not an exhaustive recap, so do not panic if something you said is not mentioned.)

I heard very clearly that many members of G.S. do not want to go through an interim time, intentional or not. Several people said "We know who we are and what we want, and we do not need an interim to help us discover this." Others expressed frustration and anger that it felt like G.S. is "treading water; sitting on our hands; not doing anything."

You are in-between permanent pastors at this time – a time of transition. This is the reality. This time of transition is supposed to be an ACTIVE time of the congregation, not a "holding period" or "treading water." Leaving out interim ministry, intentional or not, here are some suggestions of things in which you can engage to assist in the process of moving forward.

**Pray together.** Designate a specific time of day when members of the congregation will stop what they are doing and pray for God's guidance and wisdom in this time of discerning where God is calling the ministry of G.S. Say that it is 10 AM on Wednesday morning – imagine a hundred people in and around the East Bay pausing during their grocery shopping; paying bills; typing on a computer; sitting in a doctor's office; singing along to the radio; gardening; etc. and praying to God to reveal the ministry and purpose to which G.S. is being called. If the designated time doesn't work for someone, he or she can pray when they are free. It is a powerful force when the people of God collectively lift their voices in honest seeking and humble obedience.

**Plan together.** Together as a congregation, set up times to talk about the things energize and excite you in your spiritual and faith development. Service projects? Bible Studies? Guest lecturers? Look for areas that seem to indicate a strength or preferred style of the congregation. The Spirit of God is at work – here's a chance to listen how the Spirit is manifest among people at Good Shepherd.

- **Play together**. Add extra times of intentional fun and fellowship. Ideas: the first Sunday of the month, have a potluck just to re-discover old friends and discover new friends. Re-establish the dinner groups that met in homes. Have a congregational worship and playtime in a park. Have a picnic on the grounds near the street so passersby can see and wonder what fun things that church is doing. Hold a water balloon fight to cool off. Do movie night at the church or someone's home. Arrange travel for those who have difficulty getting around.
- **Go for it.** Is there a program or event you wanted the congregation to do, but it never happened? Go for it! Start planning in a way to bring the program or event off successfully. What a great initiative of ministry! What a great build of excitement!

I know all of you are anxious to move ahead as quickly as possible. This time is not to be a "holding period" until you call a new minister. That would be the interim's worst scenario. What you as a congregation and individually choose to do, or to not do, in this time of transition will shape you for a long time. The interim is the best time to talk about and clarify the hopes and questions about church life.

At this time, I do not know what will happen next in the direction of Good Shepherd. It is my hope that when I return to share the results of our conversations I will have more information for you.

#### June 11, 2012 Council Meeting Notes

Motions made at the June meeting were as follows:						
A debit card from Bank of America will be obtained for office use (to pay for postage, etc.) by office administrator.						
A new checking account will be opened as required by Bank of America to issue the debit card.						
A letter will be drafted to inform the Synod office that GSLC is not in favor of the unbalanced budget adopted at the convention. This letter will be brought back to Council for final approval at July meeting.						
Minutes from May meeting were accepted after corrections. Approval was given for use of Fellowship Hall on August 5, 2012 by members.						
Motion was made to hold one worship service during the summer at 9:30 a.m., and was defeated after discussion.						
Treasurer's report was presented with an explanation regarding the spike in unpledged receipts. This is due to the transfer of Iceberg Funds to unpledged receipts.						
Meetings between Pastor Cindy Beck and our congregation were discussed.						
Names of congregations that have participated in the new Synod Call process were sent to us. Volunteers will contact these congregations to obtain input into this process and their experience with it.						
A meeting will be held soon to inform the congregational members as to what is required to serve as a member of the Call committee.

### The Perfect Youth Worker Volunteer –Part One

What would the "perfect" youth ministry volunteer look like? Before we answer that, let's address some of the myths.

#### Myth #1 "You've got to be cool."

Let's face it, we probably weren't that cool in high school and we're certainly not cool as adults. Students don't need someone to be cool, they need authenticity. If you are willing to be yourself around teenagers, you're a great candidate for volunteering in the youth ministry.

#### Myth #2 "You've got to be young."

Sometimes we think that the 20-somethings "relate better" to teenagers because of their age. Most teenagers have a hard time telling the difference between at 25 year-old who is married and a 37 year-old who is married (they are both "old"). Research shows that teenagers are actually drawn to the oldest person in the room who will listen to them and take them seriously. If you are willing to listen to teenagers and take their problems seriously, you're a great candidate for volunteering in the youth ministry.

#### Myth #3 "You've got to act like a teenager."

There is a difference between being child-like and being childish. One of my youth ministry heroes, Duffy Robbins says, "Teenagers don't need adults who act like teenagers. They need adults who don't freak out when teenagers act like teenagers." If you can act like an adult and not "freak out" when teenagers act like teenagers, then you're a great candidate for volunteering in the youth ministry.

#### Myth #4 "You've got to a Bible scholar."

Sure, we want you to know something about the Bible, but we don't expect you to have all of the answers. In John 9, the man born blind gives us a great example of how to respond to questions we don't know the answers to, "Whether Jesus was a sinner or not, I don't know. One thing I do know, I once was blind but now I can see!" If you are willing to help students discover answers to their questions, you're a great candidate for volunteering in the youth ministry.

#### Myth #5 "You've got to know everything in teen culture."

It's okay if you don't listen to Justin Bieber and you still listen to Abba on vinyl. Students want you to be you. Many of them would even love to hear stories about the time you were in a KISS cover band! If you don't know who Justin Biebber is, you're the perfect candidate for volunteering in the youth ministry.

If these aren't the things that teenagers are looking for, what do they need in an adult volunteer? *Stay tuned for Part Two in our August newsletter!*

It was a great morning for us all. Thanks to everyone who went.



All are welcome.


