Rev's Reflections

I have a confession to make. I don't remember a single one of my 2016 New Years' resolutions; I didn't write them down. I am sure it was something like, "work out more," "lose weight," "read something other than theology," because those are goals I always have in the background of my mind. And as I write this article, I have this nagging feeling I should write down those things I want to accomplish in this new year. Lewis Carroll says, "Any road will get you there, if you don't know where you are going." If I don't write down my goals, if I don't commit, then I won't work on anything.

Often we don't know where we want to go in our spiritual lives, therefore, we don't set any kind of goal. But, we can make goals for ourselves when it comes to our spiritual lives. In the middle of last year I recognized I was using language that was inappropriate, especially in front of my children. I became aware of this when my children pretended to be me in the car and then started making bleeping sounds because they knew they aren't allowed to say some words. So, they were mimicking what happens on TV when those words are said. Sometimes your children can cut deep. I immediately felt convicted.

Scripture tells us, "The good person out of the good treasure of the heart produces good, and the evil person out of evil treasure produces evil; for it is out of the abundance of the heart that the mouth speaks" (Luke 6:45). OUCH! Sometimes scripture cuts through the soul like a knife. This means the words we use and how we use them matter. If we use words that are bitter and hurtful and full of anger, then we are showing what is in our heart. I had to come to the real conclusion there was something wrong inside that had been manifesting itself on the outside. My mouth was speaking what was in my heart; this is a spiritual issue. I was putting out in the world the discontentment and lack of self-control in my own soul, rather than the joy that is found in Jesus. Enough was enough. I asked my children to hold me accountable. Anytime I said one of the words they couldn't say, I owed 25 cents to the jar.

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I wish I could say the jar is empty. I've learned it is difficult to break ingrained habits. But, I will say every month it seems like the amount is less. In fact, this last week my wife said to me, "Your language has really improved since you began working on it." I feel like my heart is lighter as well.

My hope as a follower of Jesus is not that I am perfect in all I do. My goal is accomplished in the striving to be like our Lord. The journey itself is the goal. I want to bring life, joy, encouragement, understanding, empathy, and love to the world in my words and actions just as Jesus did.

I think we need to set all kinds of goals for ourselves, including ones that focus on our spiritual, emotional, and mental well-being. I hope in this new year you choose to be more like Jesus though the power of the Holy Spirit. This year may God show you how to live like Jesus, and may you listen and respond.

Violence, Corruption and Unemployment in El Salvador, Home of Our Sister Parish

In February, 1980, Archbishop Oscan Romero wrote to U.S. President Jimmy Carter pleading with him to suspend the U.S. military aid to El Salvador's military. He advised Carter the "Political power is in the hands of the armed forces. They know only how to repress the people and defend the interest of the Salvadorian oligarchy." Romero wrote that U.S. support would only "sharpen the injustice and repression against the organizations of the people which repeatedly have been struggling to gain respect for their fundamental human rights." Archbishop Romero was assassinated a month later while saying Mass and the U.S. continued to support the El Salvadorian military during the Reagan and Bush administrations.

Today, even though the civil war officially ended in 1992, many of the human rights violations that Archbishop Romero wrote about still exist. On a visit to El Salvador Sue Hertless remembers Pastor Flores, a Presbyterian pastor, listed El Salvador's three major problems as violence, corruption and unemployment. As Christians we are asked to serve those less fortunate and El Salvador certainly qualifies. The clothing and medical supplies Good Shepherd sent to El Salvador last September in a small way helped spreads Christian hope to our sister parish and the Salvadorian people.

Violence: In 2015 there were 6,657 murders or 18 murders a day in El Salvador, a country of a little over six million people. This makes El Salvador the murder capital of the world. As high as these numbers are, they do not include unreported murders or the hundreds (or more) people who "just disappear." Most of the violence is in areas of extreme poverty and gang infestation. During Sue Hertless and Betty Jacobsen's visit to El Salvador they never once felt afraid because our hosts made sure we avoided these areas; except when we fed the homeless at Hope House. Chistian, our guide, indicated that no one would bother us as we were with him and the people knew we were there to help. It's very important to have a good guide when there.

At the present time the government has been unable to find a balance between societal injustice and ways to address the root causes of violence such as lack of jobs, corrupt police forces and easy access to guns. This has resulted in thousands of youth either migrating to another country or joining gangs. It is estimated that 30% of those murdered belong to gangs. This violence and the lack of opportunities also results in many women and children fleeing the country.

Domestic Violence: Most of the domestic violence is against women. Over 4,500 cases of domestic violence and 575 domestic deaths were reported in 2015. Ongoing gang conflicts have resulted in an increase in some of the most heinous acts against women. Rape and sexual assaults are often committed by gangs and security forces. Abortion and miscarriage were criminalized in 1998 and 129 women have been prosecuted for homicide. Women have even been imprisoned for having a miscarriage or still birth.

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Much like here in the states women often stay quiet about domestic violence and fail to report it to authorities. In El Salvador this is due to fear, shame, terror and above all lack of trust in the judicial system as there is widespread immunity for aggressors of domestic violence.

Corruption: There is political and business corruption in El Salvador. Some reports indicated that in 2015, 74% of human rights violations were against police and soldiers. This might be due to gang-on-gang violence not being reported. When Sue and Betty were in El Salvador they observed garages, car dealerships, computer stores, banks and even a busy ice cream parlor being quietly guarded by armed guards, yet they were never afraid.

Unemployment: Sixty percent of people are unemployed in El Salvador or "live in the shadows" (work for cash or barter). A professional earns about \$240 per month in the urban area and \$180 in the rural area.

Pastor Flores and Christian, our contacts at Resurrection, do not see El Salvador as "gloom and doom" because progress is being made. As Christians they are using education to make people aware of the relationship between their faith, family, social justice and community responsibility. They emphasize an approach to problem solving that involves faith based and governmental interaction. Ever so slowly progress is being made to address social injustice.

As Good Shepherd makes plans for a trip to our sister parish in 2017, we hope you will prayerfully consider going. You will meet some beautiful people who have so little but a strong faith, stay at the Bishop's Compound and, have an experience of a lifetime observing God's work at Resurrection that will have a profound effect on your life. There will also be time for some touristy things like being able to visit the National Cathedral, Oscar Romero's home, the University, the beautiful countryside and maybe even hike to an inactive volcano or visit an art community.

Let's keep Resurrection Lutheran Church, their Bishop and the people of El Salvador in our prayers as we plan this trip.
