Rev's Reflections

"I am weary with moaning; every night I flood my bed with tears; I drench my couch with weeping. My eyes waste away because of grief they grow week because of my foes. Depart from me, all you workers of evil, for the Lord has heard the sound of my weeping. The Lord has heard my supplication; the Lord accepts my prayer." (Psalm 6:6-7a,8b-9 NRSV).

There are periods, sometimes long stretches, when all we can do is despair. We, like the psalmist, flood our bed with tears, drench our couches with weeping. We find ourselves in the mire of pain, hopelessness, and doubt about our current situation and we struggle with hope for the future. These low periods are not to be avoided. We need to enter into these places and deeply feel the pain of our circumstance. It is counterproductive to the well being our souls to cover over, push down, or ignore the darkness we're in.

Jesus himself entered into despair before his crucifixion. He asked the Father, "If it is possible, let this cup pass from me" (Matt 26:49). Jesus wanted out of his situation but in great strength acknowledged that God's will comes first. But, his submission was not without pain. Scripture tells us, "In his anguish [Jesus] prayed more earnestly, and his sweat became like great drops of blood falling down on the ground" (Luke 22:44).

Let us never gloss over the fact that our Lord, God in flesh, was in anguish. "He was oppressed, and he was afflicted" according to Isaiah 53:7.

But, we must not hold on there. It is not healthy for our soul, nor is it productive for the Kingdom to stay in the trenches of hurt, doubt, and despair. Jesus himself entered into the darkest of humanities terrors, but he didn't stay. He moved from death to life. His way forward is now a marked path. But, it's not of our own volition that we come out from the suffering. We cry Kyrie Eleison, Lord have mercy, and because the Lord accepts our prayers, he will lead us out of it.

The hope that Jesus offers is that it will not always be this way. There will be an end to sin and their will be an end to the pain that sin brings. In Jesus there is hope that we are not stuck but moving from death to life.

This Lenten season may you come to grips with the pain you face, and may you know that in Jesus there is home.



Much Admired in El Salvador – Roman Catholic Archbishop Oscar Romero

To go to El Salvador is to see how much Archbishop Oscar Romero is admired by his fellow countrymen. His image was embroidered on Bishop Madardo's stole, his picture was found at Hope Center, prominent in the National Cathedral, businesses, airport and even buses.

Bishop Romero was born in 1917 to a family that was well to do. He attended public school which at the time offered only grade one to three. Then he was tutored privately by a teacher until he was 13. His father wanted him to have a trade because in El Salvador studies seldom lead to employment and so he apprenticed him in carpentry. However, at a very young age the young Oscar indicated he'd like to study for the priesthood.


Romero entered a minor seminary in San Miguel at the age of 13. After graduation he enrolled in the national seminary in San Salvador and completed his seminary studies in 1941 at Gregorian University in Rome. He had to wait a year to be ordained into the priesthood because he was too young. When he was ordained in 1942 his family could not attend because of travel restriction during World War II. Romero remained in Rome and obtained a doctorate degree in theology.

In 1943 at the age of 26 he was summoned back to El Salvador by his Bishop. On the way home he stopped in Spain and Cuba. While in Cuba he and a fellow priest were detained in prison for several months because they came from fascist Italy. After several months, an illness and the help of a Cuban priest, the two were transferred to a hospital from which they were eventually released. They sailed to Mexico, than traveled overland to El Salvador. One can't help but wonder if this detention in Cuba increased Romero's concern for social justice.

Oscar Romero was first assigned as a parish priest in Anamoros and then moved to San Miguel where he worked for 20 years. He promoted various apostolic groups, started an Alcoholics Anonymous group and helped in the construction of the San Miguel Cathedral in addition to his pastoral duties. In 1966 he was chosen to be Secretary of the Bishops Conference for El Salvador. He served as director of the archbishop's newspaper and while he was editor the paper became fairly conservative. In 1970 Oscar Romero was appointed Auxiliary Bishop of San Salvador and in 1974 Bishop of the Diocese of Santiago de Maria, a poor, rural region of El Salvador.

In February, 1977, Romero became Archbishop of San Salvador, which was welcomed by the government. Progressive priest however feared his conservative reputation would negatively affect his commitment to the poor, but it never did. In March, 1977, Rutillo Grande a Jesuit priest and personal friend of Romero who worked among the poor creating self-reliance group was assassinated. His death had a profound impact on Romero, who stated, "When I looked at Rulilio lying there dead I thought 'If they have killed him for doing what he did then I too have to walk the same path". Romero's urged the government to investigate Rutillo's assassination but his request was ignored. In response to his friend's death, he revealed an activism that wasn't there before as he spoke out against poverty, social injustice, assassinations and torture.

In 1979, the Revolutionary Government Junta came to power amidst human rights violations and escalating violence that would become known as the Salvadoran Civil War. Archbishop Romero spoke out openly about social injustice and in February 1980 wrote to President Jimmy Carter criticizing the United States for giving military aid to the new government. He wrote that US military aid would "undoubtedly sharpen the injustice and the political repression inflicted on the organized people, whose struggle has often been for the most basic human rights." Carter ignored Romero's pleas and continued to support the military in El Salvador.



Archbishop Romero had a radio show that had the largest listenership of any program in the country at the time. His radio shows and sermons were the main source of information for many people in El Salvador, as he reported on disappearance, tortures, murders and social injustices.

On March 24, 1980, Archbishop Romero was fatally shot while celebrating mass at a memorial service. This was one day after a sermon he preached in which he had called upon Salvadoran soldiers, as Christians, to obey God's higher order and stop carrying out the government's repression and violation of human rights. To this day no one has ever been convicted of Romero's assassination.

The Archbishop's body was buried in El Salvador in a crypt beneath the National Cathedral sanctuary. His funeral was attended by more than 250,000 mourners. He was truly loved and admired by the Salvadorians, and still is. Romero was eulogized as a "beloved, peacemaking man of God" and that "his blood will give fruit to brotherhood, love and peace." The crowds outside the Cathedral during the service were met with smoke bombs and bullets. Between 20 and 50 people were killed.

In 1990 on the tenth anniversary of Romero's assassination, the sitting Archbishop of Sal Salvador appointed a postulator to prepare documentation for a cause of beautification and eventual canonization of Romero. The beautification of Archbishop Oscar Romero took place in San Salvador on May 23, 2015. Cardinal Angelo Amato officiated at the ceremony. He called Romero "a voice that continues to resonate." An estimated 250,000 people attended the beautification service, many watching on large television screens set up in the streets around the cathedral. Next step is canonization where Archbishop Oscar Romero will become a saint in the Catholic Church.


GOOD SHEPHERD BOOK CLUB


